### **WATER SUPPLY UPDATE**

Since October 2024, California's rainfall and snowpack have been right at average levels - and major reservoirs are above average.

While this is good news on a statewide level, in the Calleguas Creek Watershed, just seven inches of rain has been recorded - 47% of average. This is why our continued work on water supply planning projects with our regional partners and preparing for drought is so critical. The Delta Conveyance Project (DCP) provides a generational opportunity to invest in modernizing our water infrastructure to ensure the reliable water supply we all deserve. #### **GENERAL MANAGER'S CORNER**

How often do you think about where your water comes from? Most people don't do so often because when they turn on the shower or run their dishwasher, the water they need is clean and available. But there's an extensive - and largely invisible - network of



infrastructure, people, and ingenuity that makes that possible. In southeastern Ventura County, Calleguas is part of that network and is little known to most of the residents, businesses, farms, schools, and other water users who receive our water. That's largely because Calleguas is a wholesaler – we don't directly serve individual customers, but we deliver water to the 19 water retailers that supply water to the 650,000 residents within our service area. Hopefully this inaugural newsletter - and the informative issues to come - help give you a little peek into the complex, essential, and unseen world that brings water to your faucet every day. This issue features a new and award-winning addition to that largely invisible network, a critical infrastructure project that connects Calleguas with its neighbor and improves water supply reliability, especially in emergencies: the interconnection between Calleguas and Las Virgenes Municipal Water District. When disaster strikes, water agencies support each other - and the Southern California fires in January were no exception. Responding to an urgent call for assistance in the Altadena area, Calleguas personnel helped with cleanup and repair of critical facilities. While Calleguas wasn't directly impacted by the fires, the Public Safety Power Shutoffs resulting from the extreme wind events required both critical water supply facilities to run entirely on back up power, along with most of the distribution system, to ensure no interruption in water deliveries for the hundreds of thousands of Ventura County residents that rely on us. Years of planning, significant financial investment, and quick and creative staff action ensured that no one in the Calleguas service area lost water supply.

## AWARD-WINNING INTERCONNECTION WITH NEIGHBORING WATER SUPPLIER COMPLETE

Water systems are typically isolated from each other, serving a specific portion of a neighborhood, city, or county. While this made sense in the past. the future is water systems working together. Calleguas is pioneering that future with the recent completion of a pipeline interconnection with neighboring Las Virgenes Municipal Water District in Calabasas. Years of planning, design, and execution made this project possible. The interconnection will allow our agencies to share water in times of need, such as outages or emergencies, crossing neighborhoods, cities, and county boundaries to ensure the water keeps flowing. Our communities are more resilient today becuase of this project and it opens up possibilities for greater water supply reliability tomorrow.

We're honored that this project was recognized with the top water industry award (the "Water Oscar") by the Association of California Water Agencies earlier this year.
